CONGRESSMAN BERNIE SANDERS

Bernie Sanders introduced legislation to raise the minimum wage from \$4.25 to \$5.50 an hour. His bill, MR 692, now has 50 co-sponsors. "It's simply not right that people who work for forty hours a week still live in poverty," says Bernie.

Bernie is a national leader in the fight to create a comprehensive, single-payer health care program that would cover everyone with no-out-of-pocket expenses. Studies at both the national and state level show that single payer is, far and away, the most cost-effective way to provide universal health care.

Bernie has supported tax reform that calls on the wealthy to pay their fair share, so that we can lower taxes on the middle income and working people. He was successful in working for the passage of a major expansion of the Earned Income Tax Credit. This will help 26,000 Vermont families who earned less than \$28,000 a year to save money on their federal income tax.

Bernie is opposed to "means-testing" of Social Security benefits.

He knows the strength of Social Security is that everyone
contributes when they are working and everyone gets his/her
benefits when they retire. The National Committee to Preserve
Social Security and Medicare says that "means testing Social
Security would turn it into another welfare program."

Bernie has had a 100% rating from the League of Conservation Voters and has won the endorsement of the Sierra Club. He has helped write successful legislation on indoor air quality and energy-efficient mortgages and was the first Congressman to call for the shutdown of the Yankee Rowe nuclear reactor which is now permanently closed.

Bernie has been fighting hard for workers and the middle class, for family farmers, for veterans, for senior citizens, for women, for children and for the environment. He is fighting to change national priorities so that government works for all the people, and not just the wealthy and the powerful. Bernie has brought thousands of Vermonters into the political process.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR U.S. HOUSE JOHN CARROLL



RAISING THE MINIMUM WAGE In 1994 State Senator John Carroll voted <u>against</u> a \$.50 increase in the minimum wage. Later, he voted <u>against</u> a \$.25 increase in the minimum wage. As Republican Majority Leader in the State Senate, Mr. Carroll stated: "I do not support a minimum wage increase and I'm going to do my best to see it doesn't come to the floor."



HEALTH CARE FOR ALL In 1994 Senator Carroll proposed a health care plan that would mandate that every Vermonter be forced to purchase health insurance—whether or not he or she could afford it. The result would have been inadequate health insurance for thousands of Vermonters—at a cost that many of them could not afford.



FIGHTING FOR FAIR TAXES

Senator Carroll helped lead the effort to lower taxes on the wealthy, cut programs for the poor, and raise taxes on working people. The Rutland Herald (5/19/94) called his party's property tax reform bill "a mockery of property tax reform, insulting to Vermont taxpayers and to those who have worked hard for months to resolve the real problems of education finance."



MAINTAINING SOCIAL SECURITY Senator Carroll has recently endorsed the concept of "means-testing" for Social Security recipients to help reduce the federal deficit. Though only a small percentage of recipients would have their benefits reduced now, once means-testing begins it opens the door to future efforts to affect more and more senior citizens.



PROTECTING OUI

John Carroll led the effort to reject three Environmental Board members before even holding a hearing on their performance. A Senator from his home county called the bitter proceedings a "shameful episode" in the history of the Vermont Senate.

MORE POLITICAL GRIDLOCK?

As majority leader of the Vermont Senate, John Carroll helped to bring us the longest and most expensive legislature in modern Vermont history. The Valley News (6/1/94) states that Carroll's "record as Republican Leader in the VT Senate is relavent to running for Congress, and the legislative failure to get much accomplished this year can plausibly be laid, at least in part, at his doorstep."







Dear Fellow Vermonter,

Because of my vote for the Crime Bill which included a ban on certain types of assault weapons, the National Rifle

Association (NRA) has targeted me for defeat in the November 8 election.

Vermonters on both sides of this issue feel strongly about it, and discussing the merits of it here won't change anyone's mind. But it is important to me that Vermonters know that I have been honest with them.
